PATHETIC DEATH OF MR. J. EVERITT CAWS.—On Saturday evening, after the receipt of the news of the death of his son, Pte. Henry C. Caws, at the front, Mr. John Everitt Caws, who was sitting in his chair at home, gave a deep sigh and suddenly expired in the presence of his wife and his son, Mr. Everitt Caws. Deceased, who was 67 years of age, was for a number of years the steward at the Beulah Chapel. He was also secretary of the local branch of the Hampshire Friendly Society. The greatest sympathy is felt for the family in their heavy double bereavement. The funeral took place on Wednesday, the first part of the service being held in the Beulah Chapel, the Rev. R. Harris, of Ryde, officiating. The rev. gentleman said how sadly the deceased's face and form would be missed amongst them, and eulogised the good work he had done there. The hymns "For all the saints who from their labours rest" and "Peace, perfect peace," were sung, Mr. F. Watson presided at the organ and played the "Dead march." The chief mourners were Mr. Everitt Caws (son), Mrs. Henley, the Misses Louie, Ada, and Ella Caws (daughters), Mr. Caws, Southampton (brother), Master Herbert Caws (grandson), and Mrs. M. Caws (daughter-in-law). The Rev. R. J. Bartlett, of Sandown, and Mr. W. Hopgood, Ryde (representing the Hants Friendly Society) also attended. The coffin, of polished elm with brass fittings, bore the inscription "John Everitt Caws, died March 3rd, 1917, aged 67 years." Sprigs of myrtle were dropped into the grave on the coffin by the mourners. Amongst the beautiful floral tributes were those from the chapel and Sunday-school, the Christian Endeavour, and Band of Hope. Mr. Bull was the undertaker.
